- 4. Sharing some of the good program ideas, projects and workshops your guild has done with other guilds through our ANWG newsletters.

WORKSHOP REPORTS

Many guilds that received an ANWG grant to hold a workshop this year have now completed those workshops. "Secrets of Creativity", an Anita Luvera Mayer workshop, held by the Eugene Guild was reported in the Spring 2012 ANWG Newsletter. Following are some of the reports submitted to the Education Chair as required by the grants.

Skagit Valley Guild

Thanks to the efforts of many, the ANWG grant sponsored workshop "Novel and Unique Ways to Improve Your Weaving" was a success. The workshop was intended to cater to our general membership as well as the newer weavers in our group, and in this we succeeded. Half of the participants were beginning weavers and for several of them it was their first guild workshop.

The workshop included ideas of how to emphasize the beauty of special yarns, including novelty and handspun yarns, creative uses of thrums as well as braiding and ideas for embellishments. Tips and techniques of weaving and loom care were also covered.

The Skagit Valley Weavers Guild extends many thanks to ANWG for the grant that enabled us to offer this special workshop to our membership. We also want to thank Robyn Spady who was flexible in redesigning her workshop uniquely for us and accommodating weavers of all levels of expertise. Thank you to the Skagit Valley Weavers Guild members who contributed to make this workshop a success.



Threadbenders' Guild

Ten Threadbenders and three members of Central Oregon Spinners and Weavers, along with 2 members auditing, met with Sarah Pilgrim for three days in September to dig deeply into "Warp and Skein Painting-Not Your High School Chemistry Class".

During the first two days, Sarah gave instructions for three techniques of painting threads, as well as three methods for processing the threads. Having been encouraged by Sarah to experiment with different fibers, we were intrigued by the varying results, *e.g.*, the sheen of tencel alongside a cotton, a variety of wools and how they took the dye differently.

On the third day of the workshop, Sarah held two seminars on topics chosen by the guild, "More Ideas on Using Painted Threads" and "Using Various Fibers". Everyone left with some good, useable ideas and tips.

We are grateful to ANWG for the grant monies that helped make this workshop available to our members, as well as our guests.





Montana Association of Weavers and Spinners

MAWS 2012 was very privileged to have Sara Lamb as one of the conference instructors. Sara's classes were some of the first to fill up and it was obvious from those who registered early, that they were coming to learn from her.

Sara has been spinning, dyeing, weaving, knitting and learning new things for over 35 years. She is the author of <u>Woven Treasures</u> (Interweave Press, 2009).

Attendees who took her classes commented on the fact that she was well organized, and a very patient instructor with weavers of all skill levels signed up for her classes.

Sara presented a wonderful Keynote Address entitled "Color and the Creative Process". Through her spoken words and a beautiful slide show, she demonstrated how she uses nature to inspire her woven works.

Sara was also asked to choose the winner of the Handweavers Guild of America Award from entries in the open show.

ANWG provided financial support to MAWS, enabling them to have Sara hold workshops on Inkle Weaving, Card Weaving, Pickup Bands, and a 2-day Post Conference Class for Knotted Cut Pile Rugs on June 8, 9, 11, and 12.





Midnight Shuttles Spinners and Weavers

On April 21 and 22, 2012 MSSW held a workshop with Elaine Duncan entitled "Colour and Design Exercises for the Fibre Artist". Eleven members participated.

Elaine led the guild through 21 excellent exercises during the two day workshop. The samples prepared in each exercise were wrapped on strips of cardstock with double-sided sticky tape. After covering colour definitions, *i.e.*, colour, hue, primaries, secondaries, tertiaries, intensity, value, tints, tones, and shades, Elaine took them through the exercises.

The exercises included using the grey scale to describe and number colors of yarns; adding white, black, and grey to pure color; selecting tints, tones, and shades of a hue; developing colour schemes with split complementary and triadic complementary colours; finding examples of monochromatic, analogous, complementary, split complementary, and triadic complementary schemes in magazines and calendars. Other exercises moved on to Colour Bridging, using the grey scale and moving toward the center of the color wheel using tones and shades until they blended in the center. Yarns with a greyed hue were selected and placed with others to make them darker then lighter, brighter then duller.

Comments from the participants near the end of the day:

- Very engrossing. Makes you do what you have put off doing
- Excellent instructor, very well organized, liked hands on, liked way we worked our way through colour wheel





Richmond Weavers and Spinners Guild

Rosalie Neilson presented her two-day workshop, "Colour and Design in Rep Weave" to 16 weavers at the Richmond Arts Centre on Sept. 29 & 30, 2012. The weavers' experience levels ranged from advanced beginner to very experienced. Most of the weavers, however, had little prior experience with Rep Weave.

This workshop was booked one year in advance of the presentation. In April of 2012, Rosalie provided us with the 40-page Workshop Instruction Manual. We made copies immediately and handed them all out by the end of May, which was the cut-off for payment for the workshop. We were then to create our sampler warp from the assortment of profiles she provided. The workshop coordinators felt it was very helpful to the participants to have the instructions so far ahead of the workshop. The weavers had lots of time to really absorb the information and get help if they needed it. The participants from the Richmond Guild met in groups several times help each other with the manual and exchange help with colour choices.

One interesting challenge for the workshop coordinators and Rosalie, as well, was yarn conversion. The yarn Rosalie Neilson prefers to use is very costly and hard to obtain in Canada. So, initially, we had to send Rosalie samples of yarn that was more suitable for us. Rosalie did some testing with our samples and determined they would be fine for the sampler. This was a considerable cost saving for us.

This workshop is not a round robin. Rosalie spent time with each weaver to check their progress. She gave constructive colour critiques and suggestions for future projects. We also had a guild member act as a designated helper for both days of the workshop. This person did not participate in any weaving, but just rotated around from weaver to weaver helping with anything necessary. This was an intense, informative and challenging workshop. We were taught a lashing on technique that Rosalie uses to control warp tension with Rep Weave. This was brand new to many of the weavers. The less experienced weavers also learned much about profile drafting and block theory.

Rosalie gave a very interesting group lecture on colour and yarn choices. This was visually supported with many of her own exquisite pieces that she brought along to show us. Several of the pieces she brought were featured on the cover of Handwoven.

To summarize, there were many really positive learning opportunities that came from this workshop. We learned a lot about Rep weave! Many of the weavers were pushed beyond their own weaving comfort zones because they had to master new ideas. This workshop was a challenge. Everyone basically completed a beautiful rep sampler. We did not cut them off the looms, but unrolled all of them and discussed each one.

Desert Sage Spinners and Weavers Guild

The Desert Sage Spinners & Weavers Guild (located in Oliver, BC in the sunny Canadian Okanagan) was thrilled to be able to sponsor Sarah Swett to instruct our very first tapestry workshop. This was designed as a 4-day workshop to allow participants to delve into this medium and immerse themselves in their own work and creativity. Immerse they did!

Sarah framed the workshop as "The Value of Value" and provided rich learning opportunities for everyone. Working with perspectives, colour and values, and applied mentoring, Sarah was able to bring her incredible expertise to the class, such that everyone found their own creative skills quickly developing. Participants ranged from weavers with no tapestry experience to those with solid practice and by the end of the four days Sarah had skillfully supported all levels to increased knowledge in the world of tapestry.

Sarah is a remarkable woman, a gifted weaver, and an amazing instructor! She displayed samples of her work, demonstrated intricate details in hands' on sessions, provided one-on-one mentoring ~ all of it combining to create an exceptional experience for all participants. While lunch was provided each day for everyone, we found that lunch breaks were only taken with enough time to visit the buffet, then back to the looms.

We were able to hold this class in a beautiful old school building in Penticton, now home of the 'Shatford Centre for the Arts'. Our classroom was filled with natural light and the space was ideal for our tapestry work. Tapestry weaving is often correlated to a meditative practice. This seemed true when you took a quiet moment to watch fifteen heads' bowed to their loom, weaving without comment – I swear if you listened carefully, you would have heard the looms singing!

We want to thank ANWG for helping realize this workshop with your gracious funding – it has been an absolute pleasure and we are now discussing forming a tapestry group in our guild to continue with our collective learning.



Portland Handweavers Guild

"If you have always wanted to understand weave structure so that you could design structures yourself instead of having to "shop" in books and magazines for a draft, this is the class for you, a workshop focusing on the structure of woven fabrics."

Seventeen members of the Portland Handweavers Guild gathered to take Sharon Alderman's two-day workshop "Mastering Weave Structure" in March of 2012. Comments from participants are shown here.

"Sharon went through examples for working out our own weave structures as well as determining drafts, etc. There was something for everyone no matter what the skill level was. The participants appreciated the grant very much as the fee was subsequently reduced."

"Overall, the workshop really inspired me to work on developing my own designs rather than rely on the "cookbook" method of copying a weave structure I find interesting."

"It was Sharon Alderman, how could we not learn something. What was great for me was when she was explaining a certain fabric with her drawings of the structure, I got it, and the design potential, and was really excited to work with it."

"Sharon did a great job of gearing the workshop to different levels of weaving experience from beginners to advanced. She bases the workshop on her book, Mastering Weave Structures, going chapter by chapter and using samples of each weave structure to illustrate, then let us examine. Even though her book is well-written and detailed, it was very valuable to have things explained and be able to ask questions to clarify points. She was also very generous in sharing general weaving tips and tricks that have made her successful."

Alpine Weavers and Spinners Guild

Alpine Spinners and Weavers Guild of Kalispell, MT held a "Beaded Tapestry Woven Bag" workshop on September 22, 2012 with instructor Joan Contraman.

The class started with Joan providing a demonstration of how the wooden looms were to be warped. Joan's pegged loom has the advantage of being warped front and back, so actually 2 bags can be woven, to take advantage of the entire warp.

Every kit contained abundant "butterflies" of various yarns which students were encouraged to mix, match, and complement in "waves" as the weaving progressed. The kits also contained beads, needles and thread; and Joan demonstrated how to include strings of seed beads to highlight areas within the weaving. There were samples on display for weavers to study.

Lastly, students were instructed how to finish, back, line and assemble the bags and how to make and attach a handle. This was a full day class and students were pleased with their one-of-a-kind creations.
