## SPECIAL NOTICE (Revised)

From Celeste Pryde, Membership Chair and Ruth Locke, Treasurer

Yes, ANWG does have a membership policy. Because our operating capital (i.e., the money used to print and distribute the newsletter, reimburse Board members for attending meetings, etc.) comes from dues, the failure of any of our member guilds to renew their memberships presents a serious problem. Not only does the treasury suffer, but the overall health of the organization is weakened.

Here, then, is the policy for 1999. Reps, please share this with your Treasurer and follow up to make sure that your guild is current. To renew, use the form on Page 5, (also available from the website). If you did not renew for 1998, you must also pay \$10.00 for reinstatement (normally this is \$25.00).

- 1. The membership year is now November 1 through October 31. Dues for membership in the upcoming year are payable on or before Nov. 1, 1998 and are considered late if not paid by December 1, 1998 (a one month grace period). Dues are based on the guild membership as of October 31. There is no need to pay for members who join later in the year.
- 2. Dues paid after December 1, 1998, but before February 1, 1999, will be assessed a late fee of \$10.00, in addition to the \$1.00/guild member fee.
- 3. Guilds which do not maintain a continuous Association membership (i.e. if the dues are not paid by February 1, 1999) are assessed a penalty fee of \$25.00 for reinstatement.

## And in this corner...

I have several items of interest which came to my Editor's desk since the last issue. Laura Fry's column *Life is a Sample* entitled "Economics" sparked a response from one of our members. The item describing the features of the ANWG website caused another member to write me with concerns about the appropriateness of ANWG adopting this technology as a means of communication. I am including the main points of this letter within. If you have an opinion one way or the other, by all means send them to me, and I will include them.

The issue of who should have access to the Information Highway is an important one. For instance, in the US most schools and many public libraries offer free web access. It is our hope that those of you in the Northwest who do use the Internet take it upon yourselves to share whatever you find of interest with your fellow guild members, whether it is from our site, or elsewhere.

Consider these statistics from a recent newspaper article written by the Associate Press... "Recent studies show that the number of women 50 and over using the Internet has increased 50 percent in the past nine months." And from the October 20, 1998 PC Magazine... "Market research firm Jupiter Communications says that the fastest-growing age segment on the Web is 50 and older... Women are expected to make up 42 percent of surfers on the Internet by the end of this year, and 51 percent by 2000," according to market research firm eMarketer. Several sites now target older women (and men), specifically, www.iVillage.com and Yahoo! Seniors' Guide. After visiting these sites, I'm convinced of the "greying" of the Internet, myself!

Will websites eventually replace newsletters? Spinners' Connection editor Peggy Coffee addresses this very issue in the Fall issue of Spin Off magazine. Her judgement, and mine, is that "newsletters have a significance that cannot be measured in words." Websites, e-mail and electronic discussions are enhancements to, not substitutes for communication. I for one do not intend to replace the Northwest News with the Website.

Included in this issue is a "Guide to the Website" which will hopefully aid those who are newly or soon-to-be online in getting the most out of this new (and sometimes confusing) resource.

## **Anwg '99 Item Exchange**

The Billings Weaver's Guild is handling the arrangements for an Item Exchange at SETT Under the Big Sky. Keeping in mind that the goal is to interest as many participants as possible, there will be three categories:

- 1) Handwoven Tea Towel
- 2) Bookmark
- 3) Handspun Yarn

This is an item-for-item exchange. If you submit one item in a category, you will receive one item in the same category. If you submit two or more, you will receive two or more. You may enter one, two, or three categories.

**Guidelines for the Handwoven Tea Towel**—Minimum size 18" x 24". Fibers used are your choice but must be functional; towels must be carefully finished by hemming or hemstitched with fringe. Finished article should be washed and pressed. Directions for duplicating the towel must be included (threading, treadling, sett, materials, etc.).

Guidelines for Bookmark—Minimum size 1 ½" x 6"; fibers used are your choice; technique is your choice (tatted, beaded, crocheted, woven, lace, etc). Pertinent information in order to duplicate the bookmark must be included.

**Guidelines for Handspun Yarn**—Minimum length of skein is 30 yards; fibers used are your choice. A card must be attached to the skein which indicates the fibers used, how they were prepared (carded, combed, etc.), and how they were spun (woolen, worsted, etc.).

Each submitted article must include an envelope containing a card with the participant's name and address and a short biography. A photo of yourself, your loom, or your wheel would be nice, but is not required. Distribution of items will be made at the conference. If you want to be included but cannot attend the conference, your exchange items will be mailed to you for a \$5.00 fee. Dates for entering and deadline for submitting articles will be published in subsequent Newsletters. For further information at this time you may contact a member of the committee. ## Olympia Scholarship

The Olympia Guild established a scholarship in memory of an influential weaving teacher from Evergreen State University, Hazel Pattison. The Hazel Pattison Memorial Grant provides a monetary support for a year-long personal study. While all of the recipients are responsible for presenting their work in a guild program format, several have also resulted in study notebooks that will be maintained in the library for the benefit of future guild members.

A piece produced by scholarship recipient Marjorie Erickson can be seen on page 23 in the Spring '98 issue of Shuttle, Spindle & Dyepot. Lana Schneider's article on Designing Algebraically published in the Jan/Feb 1998 issue of Handwoven, became the catalyst for applying for the grant. Lana says, "We who have benefitted from the grant cherish the opportunity it provides: an incentive to focus on a subject that already challenges us." N

## In Reply to "Economics"

Laura Fry raised a number of interesting and debatable issues in her recent column in the [Summer 1998] Northwest News titled "Economics", many of which I use as starting points for the Introductory Economics classes that I teach at Montana State University. For example, there is the common misconception that the economist is the culprit in the so-called belittling of the work of craftspeople and women because their work is omitted in GNP. Such an accusation is of course similar to blaming my accountant because I have to pay 10% more taxes this year, when the real culprit is the fact that my income increased. Economists include in GNP the value of items that are exchanged through markets, not because they like markets per se, but rather because there is a record of this transaction. If you as a weaver sold your items (the linen tablecloth) at the local gallery, or operated a business, then these items would be counted in GNP assuming that they were reported to the IRS. Alternatively, if you want the item to be included in GNP all you need to do is report the net value of the tablecloth that you made and sold to yourself.

Likewise with the labor performed in other areas of the home. If I change the oil in my car, the only amount that figures into GNP is the cost of the oil and filter assuming that I have not messed up and done other damage to my car in the process. If I have the oil changed at the local jiffy-lube, then what is included in GNP is more than the cost of the oil and filter.

I think the point to be made is that some people believe that society does not value highly enough the work of artists, including weavers, i.e., the price that the artist receives is by some standard too low. But this is a subjective judgement, because if it was a fact shared equally by all people, (other than the evil economists) then the price would be bid up since the quantity of artsy output demanded by society would exceed the quantity currently being supplied at the low price! I don't believe that there is some group of evil economists that are deliberately sabotaging the art and weaving world and keeping the price too

Furthermore, value should not be confused with price. Value reflects my personal taste and preferences and is the maximum amount that I would be willing to pay for the item. Price is what an item would actually exchange for in a

market where there exists buyers and sellers. Obviously if the price of the tablecloth exceeds how much an individual values it, then the tablecloth will not be purchased by that individual. Values are subjective; just because I might value a handwoven tablecloth at \$100 doesn't mean that the price should be \$100.

Economists have not dehumanized the world; all we have done is point out that humans are by their very nature greedy animals, who in the course of pursuing their own self interest often benefit the human race. I would venture to suggest that the amount of time that Faberge spent producing his works of art for the czar were somewhat related to his alternatives. I'm also not convinced that many people today would permanently trade places with someone living prior to the industrial revolution. Economists don't manipulate people's preferences (sometimes I wish I did possess such powerful talents—it would come in handy with teenagers!). Changing people's tastes and preferences is considered the domain of the highly-paid advertising executives!

Laura's observation that GNP would increase if the productivity of all people were counted is correct. And GNP would also look different if we correctly accounted for the changes in the environment, (air pollution, water pollution and other changes to the environmental resource base) and other productive outputs, like self-oil-changes, that go uncounted. The error that is made is to infer from a measure such as GNP that women working in the home are not productive, or that something that I weave has little value to me personally because it is not exchanged through a market at a high price.

## **The Master Weaver Certificate**

Laura Fry, Education Chair for ANWG, is the most recent recipient of the Master Weaver Certificate sponsored by the Guild of Canadian Weavers. Laura, along with fellow Master Weaver and ANWG member Marg Hahn, presented a program on the certification process at the ANWG Spring Meeting in Kelowna, B.C., Canada on June 6,

The Guild of Canadian Weavers was founded in 1947 by three notable weavers, who then established the Master Weaver testing program. In order to earn a certification as a Master Weaver one must complete three other levels of testing; beginner, intermediate, and senior. Laura is only the twenty-seventh person to earn the Master Weaver certification since its inception. She also supplied samples of wet finishes to the Guild of Canadian Weavers newsletter for 1998.

The crucial element of the Master level is a monograph on a specific topic of study. Laura and Marg brought along their research materials for their certification, comprised mainly of notebooks containing samples and descriptions of each facet of the certification process. Laura's topic of study was "Wet Finishing," Marg's was "Opphämtta". Laura brought several other study notebooks of previous certificate recipients as well. It was inspiring to see the different topics chosen, and how intensely each recipient had pursued the range of possibilities of design and execution within a narrow focus.

Laura and Marg each spent some time describing the procedures they used to fulfill the requirements for certification at the Master level. Once a topic is chosen, a series of samples must be produced and documented. This approach, rather than quelling curiosity, seems to encourage the "Oh, I see!!" and the "If that is so, what about this?" approach to really studying a subject closely. After seeing the amount of research, weaving, and meticulous notation of each topic necessary to achieve the Certificate, I was convinced that not only would participating in the program enhance any weaver's understanding of their individual area of interest, but it would also give them a methodology by which to study any other facet of weaving in which they might become interested. In other words, "sample, sample, sample!!" but with a very well-defined purpose.

Laura emphasized that even though the program is Canadian-sponsored, it is open to U.S. citizens as well. There is also no limit to the amount of time each prospective Master Weaver might take in pursuing the certificate after initially applying. The most important aspects of completion seem to be persistence and attention to detail. Clearly, the decision to apply for the Master Weaver certification should not be done casually, but the benefits of such a well-defined program of study are indisputable. Membership in the Guild of Canadian Weavers costs \$15.00 per year, and includes a Handbook, Test Requirements, a quarterly newsletter, and Library and Membership List. ## **New Overshot Pattern Book**

Four years ago, four weavers from the Vermont Weaver's Guild went to the Shelburne Museum in Shelburne, Vermont, to analyze, research and document the fifty coverlets held in their collection. Once the coverlets were recorded, members of the guild chose a pattern and wove enough for every participant to have a sample of each. Since then, a 75 page, spiral bound, soft cover book entitled *Echoes from Our Ancestors* has been published including 21 of the patterns and 14 color copies of the woven samples. For each pattern, there is a drawdown with any available history regarding the coverlet or weaver and information about the original coverlet. The price of the book is \$24.00 including shipping. ## **Security and Confidentiality**

Firstly, several folks have mentioned their fear that the rosters of the member guilds (names, addresses, etc.) might be posted on the website. This will not happen, nor will the list be sold or given to anyone. The rosters which are sent to the Membership Chair, Celeste Pryde, are used to document and support our non-profit status, and to provide mailing lists for conference organizers. The number of members also determines how many newsletters are mailed to each guild.

Secondly, precautions have been taken against programs which seek out e-mail addresses for the purpose of sending unsolicited e-mail, or "spam". This aspect and many others unique to the Internet and the Web are described in the Website and Help pages. Please consider reading these during your visit to the site.

## **Speakers' Directory**

For the time being, we will list the Speakers' Directory on the ANWG website only. Once posted, anyone with web access can download the information, so even if only one guild member has access to the Internet, that person can pass on the appropriate information. This does not cost extra, whereas putting out a printed copy of the Directory gets quite costly. It will also enable us to keep the Directory and the information on each speaker as current as possible.

Anyone interested in being listed in the Speakers' Directory should send their name and address (you do not have to have an e-mail address!) plus the titles of their workshops/seminars and a short description to Laura Fry, Education Chair (see Masthead on Page 2 for her address). Only the information you want to be posted will be included. For instance, if you would prefer, only your e-mail address will appear. If you have no e-mail address, Laura's will be given as a contact. Of course, if you have your own home page or other web presence, a link can be provided.

#### Other Features

Several of the "interactive" areas on the website are now functioning. Two of them are under Resources. Individual members may now enter their own Classified Ad or list any textile event of interest (local, regional or international) on the Calendar by using the on-line forms provided. An individual may put as many items as they wish in the Classifieds, with whatever they wish for contact information (or post them for someone without Web access). The ads will stay up for 30 days, after which they will automatically be removed. If it hasn't sold, just re-enter it. Of course, you may request that an ad be removed any time prior to this time limit. They are really easy to use, however if you feel timid about entering your ad or event, please don't hesitate to e-mail Yvonne for help. We need more listings for both of these areas!

The Activity area for the Guilds also has been upgraded so that the contact member can enter or edit their guild's activities. See How to Submit Material below for specific directions.

The forms for Membership, Scholarships and the Website Information are also now available on the site under Forms.

## **How to Submit Material for the ANWG Website**

If your guild is not yet represented on the website, have your rep or newsletter editor fill out the website form (available in the Resources area) and send it, along with any additional information, to the webmaster, Jerry Coopmans. Once your guild's pages are up, you may add/update events on your Activities page.

## How to update your guild's Activities page.

The Activities page for your guild can be completely maintained by anyone in your guild with Internet access. It can be changed/updated as often as you like.

Use the feedback page to contact the webmaster for instructions.

We especially need pictures of your guild members' work to display on your Gallery page. Additional web space is available if your guild or state organization wants to have additional pages. Send any pictures to:

## Pills Are Not For Wearing

From the *Fall '98 Vogue Knitting Magazine* comes news of a new spinning technique from Radford Yarn Technologies, Christchurch, New Zealand, which yields a pill-resistant yarn. No chemicals are used in the production of this yarn, but rather a process dubbed Watermill<sup>TM</sup> by which individual ends of merino roving are agitated in hot water and then dried with hot-air, slightly felting the yarn. Although available in an off-white at present, yarn marketer Classic Elite plans on adding more colors for Fall/Winter '99, and Radford is currently testing the process on mohair and alpaca.



# Executive Board Telephone Conference Call

Tuesday, November 10, 1998

Present were Betty Bell, Jane Kenyon, Ruth Locke, Laura Fry, Yvonne Coopmans, Pam Refling, Karin Utzinger, Sue Scott, and Celeste Pryde.

**ANWG General Membership Meeting (AGM)**—Probably be held Thursday morning (August 5) as a breakfast meeting. Sue Scott will send a letter to Reps informing them of the meeting and will be directly contacting guilds, especially those who haven't had Reps at recent AGM's to bring them up to date on the Association.

ANWG Conference Reserves—Pam Refling reported that she had been asked to find someone at Montana State University who might advise the Board as to the amount of money the Board should keep in the conference reserve account to cover possible shortfalls in conference revenues. She will send recommendations to Board Members when she has the information.

**ANWG '99—Pam** reported that Bozeman had \$10,000 in seed money for the 1999 conference, that there were \$4,200 in operating expenses, \$582 left in checking. Ruth also said that if Eugene, OR, needs start-up funds for the 2001 conference, there is sufficient money in the Flexifund to cover that.

Education Chair—Laura Fry said she has received 11 applications for the \$200 conference scholarships and knows of at least one more that might come in. Celeste Pryde and Karin Utzinger volunteered to serve on the selection committee with Laura.

Laura also noted receiving numerous requests for the videos. She has an annual budget of \$200 for acquisitions, etc. The most recent additions are three videos from Convergence. The videos are listed on the Association's web page. The Board discussed the web page and thought it might be a good idea to make a hard copy of that information to hand out at the conference for ANWG members not having access to the Internet

In addition, President Betty Bell suggested that since most public libraries provide Internet access for the public that members without computers be encouraged to check with their public libraries.

Laura called for photos and other information she might put in the ANWG conference booth, and said that if someone was interested, that person could sit in the booth and field questions.

Membership— Celeste Pryde reported a membership of 71 guilds, with a total of 2,600 members. Alberta has the largest guild, with 191 members. December 1st is the deadline for paying dues. She has sent packets, complete with copies of the Constitution and By Laws, to all new member guilds.

**Newsletter—Yvonne Coopmans** said it took about \$300 per issue for the newsletter, including printing, envelopes and postage.

Web Page—Cost for server is \$18.95 per month.

**Rep's Responsibilities—Karin Utzinger** had pointed out that the Constitution and By Laws already describe these responsibilities.

Ruth Locke moved that the dues deadline change to December (on which the Board had previously agreed) be published in the next newsletter as a proposed change to the bylaws, to be voted on at the AGM in August. Sue Scott seconded the motion, and

it passed unanimously. Jane Kenyon pointed out that we do not have to have absentee ballots for guilds not at the AGM.

The board agreed we should add to the Reps' responsibilities that they get out the info on scholarships, collect the applications and send them to the scholarship committee.

Conference Booklet—The board discussed having the conference organizers compile a booklet with tips for future conferences, suggestions for procedure, time lines, what did and did not work, procedures for securing grants, etc. Pam Refling noted that Kathy Swift-Thompson, a coordinator for the 1983 conference, had offered to work on one. A long discussion followed regarding the fact that some coordinators want guidelines, some do not, what is expected of coordinators by way of periodic reports to the Board, how to get information from conference planners to the newsletter, and the importance of having coordinators at board meetings.

There was general consensus that it would be nice for the Association to send a letter of welcome to the incoming conference coordinator and let that person know what the Board expects by way of reports, etc. Betty Bell said she would do this.

**Speakers Directory—Betty Bell** urged establishing communication with each guild to learn of programs they have had. ANWG will focus on using the web page and newsletter to publicize these speakers instead of printing the Speakers Directory.

Nominating Committee—Sue Scott asked for names of possible board nominees from Oregon or Idaho since that area needs representation on the Board right now. All of the current board members plan to stay on except for Jane Kenyon, past president, and Karin Utzinger, secretary. With the progression upwards from vice president and the retirement from the Board, nominees are especially needed for Vice Chair and Secretary.

The question arose as to whether individuals scattered through sparsely populated areas might start a guild via the web. Since ANWG just specifies that membership is only for guilds and that guilds must be made up of three or more persons, it would appear that people might form a guild in any way they choose.

The meeting was adjourned at 10 p.m. MST following a motion by Ruth Locke and a second by Celeste Pryde to do so.



## **By Law Amendments Proposed**

To be voted on at the AGM August 5, 1999.

The following is the wording of the proposed amendments to the ANWG By Laws, changes are denoted in brackets.

Article II Membership, Section Two There shall be regular member dues assessed upon vote of a quorum of the representatives. Dues are assessed on the total number of memberships in the individual member guild on December 31 [October 31], with dues payable on January 1 [November 1] of the calendar year and delinquent after February 1 [December 1]. A penalty fee (\$10.00) in addition to member dues, may be assessed, subject to appeal. Dues not paid after February 1 [December 1] will result in a loss of membership. A fee of \$25.00 will be assessed for reinstatement.

## In this Past Year...

## A Few Guild Projects in Brief

Weaving and spinning are tactile arts... few people can resist stroking a shiny, silky shawl or feasting their eyes on an intricately patterned rug. Public events such as the County Fair, Art in the Park or any festive occasion will be seized on by fiber artists as an opportunity to demonstrate their passion for spinning and weaving. Fashion Shows, Sheep to Shawl competitions, and weaving exhibits are common. Two of the more unusual activities I have read about in the newsletters are conducted by the Prince George Spinners and Weavers. In conjunction with a Tapestry display at the Prince George Art Gallery this October, the guild members help set up and weave on a tapestry. Additional activities included a children's loom and a miniworkshop with small cardboard looms.

The Desert Fibre Arts Guild in Richland, Washington, worked from January, 1998 on an installation entitled "Home on the Reach" for display at the Allied Arts Gallery in January, 1999. Their work depicted a home setting in which wild fish live with humans. Every detail of the "house" was fiber-related.

Many of the ANWG guilds have funds designated for scholarship programs or workshops. Although they are set up in different ways, they all work to support their mandates to foster understanding and enjoyment of the textile arts. The Salem Handweavers' Guild inaugurated a scholarship program this spring, and the first recipient has used the money to enroll in a "Beginning Weaving" class at the Textile Center in Salem.

The Olympia Guild established a scholarship in memory of an influential weaving teacher from Evergreen State University, Hazel Pattison.

#### Fiber Trust Thank You Gifts

As an affiliate of Handweavers Guild of America, The Seattle Weavers' Guild felt a need to encourage individuals to support The Fiber Trust, an endowment program administered by the HGA.

Susan Snover, the HGA Rep, first proposed a reward of a handwoven gift to Fiber Trust donors of \$100 or more.

Tomoe Edwards designed the gifts, organized the effort and wove many of the towels as well. Other SWG weavers who worked on this project include Mako Cho, Becky Barnes, Ann Neal, Lana Schneider, and Georgean Curran.

The 1997 Fiber Trust Campaign raised \$22,800 for HGA. Each of the 101 Fiber

Trust donors recently received a spectacular handwoven breadcloth.

Finished breadclothes measured 20 ½ " by 17 ½ ". They were woven of 10/2 cotton at 30 epi. The Canvas weave pattern combined one of Davison's patterns with the Swedish magazine VÄV's issue 2-85.

## **Internet Mail Lists**

For as long as the Internet has existed there have been cybernetic forums where people have "met" to dialogue, exchange information or just play games. Depending on your race, gender, political orientation or artistic inclinations, there is a forum for you.

Some of these exchanges take place as "chats" in real time so that each message is read and responded to as it is sent. This type of exchange requires each participant to log on to the chat at the same time. Often there is no record of what was said, so you have to actually be there, participating. There is such a chat on the ANWG website, free for anyone with Java enabled browsers who wish to use it

The second form of exchange is the newsgroup or on-line forum. These require a web browser or a news reader (often part of a browser these days). Messages are posted when sent and may be read and responded to at any time. We also have a Forum on the ANWG website.

A third format of electronic exchange are the e-mail lists, which requires only an e-mail program for participation.

Among the many special interests served by these mail lists are the fiber crafts; spinning, weaving, dyeing, felting, beading, etc. Subscription to these lists is free, requiring only that you send a short e-mail message in order to begin receiving the postings. Unsubscribing is just as simple; keeping up with the volume of messages is the real trick!! Each mail list has their own address and wording, so the best thing to do if you are interested in trying out one of these lists is to go to Ron Parker's website (address at the end of this article) and read about the 60 lists there.

It is possible to collect a lot of tips by using the text editing features of your mail program. Highlight the text of interesting bits of information, Copy it, and Paste it into a word processing program such as WordPad or NotePad, and Save it with a name which refers to the topic. Add all the subsequent messages which other people send in reference to the topic, and print the file out for filing in your paper files.

Kay Reiber, a thoughtful weaver, (and the first American to have receive the Master of Weaving certificate from the Guild of Canadian Weavers) has made the observation that time spent on the computer and the Web can subtract from time spent spinning and weaving. Although this can be true, time spent reading about other's experiences, knowledge, or sources can save a lot of time and money. There are several master weavers, a couple of retired textile mill managers, and some of the loom manufacturers, not to mention many intermediate weavers, on the Weaving List alone. Having direct access to these knowledgeable and sharing weavers easily offsets time spent on reading any less than useful information.

The lists are watched over by a List Administrator who insures that they stay friendly and relatively "on topic". It is possible to find yourself spending considerable amounts of time filtering out information other than that in which you are interested. Usually one can choose to receive the posts either as individual e-mails or in a digest form, with ten or so messages compiled before being sent to you.

A few members of our guild, The Greater Vancouver Spinners' and Weavers' Guild, have formed a dye club. Our first project was to follow the proportions for mixing of primary colors of dye stocks laid out in Linda Knudson's book, using several different types of red, yellow, blue in Procion MX dye (dyeing cellulose fibers). We

weighed dye powders and measured liquids carefully, using good scales and syringes. Our samples were dyed in small plastic cups. Working together, we dyed enough so each of us could have a fat sample book, plus we were able to donate a book to our guild. Then we dyed bundles of silk and wool fibers with Telana (using small canning jars in canners on camp stoves) and came up with second sets of samples for ourselves and the guild. For both sets, we dyed pastel as well as medium shades, making the samples even more useful. After having a great time working together we each had wonderful references for our own dyeing.

## Video Review

## **Tapestry Weaving Part 1** by Nancy Harvey

Reviewed by Lyn Ivens, Sept. 1998 Length: No time available

This video is a complete course on beginner's tapestry weaving. Included with it are helpful written instructions. The video is roughly divided into 3 sections or projects. There are directions on the construction of a homemade frame loom using nails and simple wood materials in Project 1. Nancy has clear directions on how to start weaving, from the header to the double half hitches which secure the warp ends. Other topics covered were: equipment; butterflies; tension; bubbling the weft; using a

cartoon; opposite wefts in the same shed; packing the weft in place; weaving simple shapes; adding new colours; yarn weights; slit technique; lazy line technique, etc... It is lovely to watch Nancy's graceful movements when she packs and taps in place the weft with her wooden comb beater. Project 2 used horizontal & vertical stripes, weft interlock, and other techniques. Project 3, the most difficult on the video, showed how to weave a circle, and finishing your project. All projects leave time to stop and practice the techniques. I enjoyed this video very much because of the clear presentation and the wealth of information it contained. Nancy Harvey is pleasant and an excellent teacher. I look forward to viewing Part 2, Advanced Tapestry Weaving.

## Help for "Slow" Finishers

The "I Hate to Finish Sweaters" Guide to Finishing Sweaters

I suspect that I am like many intermediate knitters; even though I've completed several sweaters I still have the sensation of "feeling my way" through the shaping and seaming of the various pieces. I had assumed that my problem was personal, I just needed more experience in order to make this step of sweater making easy. Therefore, when I heard the title of this book, written by a member of the ANWG associate guild, the Alpine Spinners and Weavers of Kalispell, Montana, I was intrigued. If someone has written an entire book the subject, there must be more to assembling those pieces than my self-taught method of trial and error.

Janet's book has enabled me to pinpoint the reason for my unease; the difficulties I was experiencing weren't my fault after all. I had built them in simply by following the instructions, without understanding how the edges of the various pieces were going to fit together. After reading just the first chapter of this book it was easy for me to appreciate how some selvedges, if produced according to the directions in the patterns, are destined to result in lumpy, visible seams, curling hems, or crooked collars.

Using Janet's method, the finishing process actually begins with a first read-through of the pattern and a subsequent alteration of the methods of casting on, increasing, decreasing, etc. so that you, the knitter, determine exactly how each seam will behave. Janet's premise is that a successful finish is attained by anticipating which stitches are compatible when seamed, and then using those for the seams. Minor changes of a stitch or two will make a major difference in the final assembly.

Janet's writing style is crystal clear while at the same time warm, encouraging, and conversational. She uses numerous and clean illustrations of specific techniques where they are needed, and a generous and thorough bibliography is included, evidence that Janet has really done her homework. A certain amount of basic knitting expertise on the part of the reader is assumed, however, a source for each technique is sited when not described.

The "I Hate to Finish Sweaters" Guide to Finishing Sweaters is taking a place in the "constant reference" category on my bookshelf.

## Get Hemp, Man!

On August 14, 1998, after four years of experimental production on farms in Ontario and Manitoba, Canada harvested its first commercial hemp crop in nearly sixty years. The demonstration harvest took place at La Riviere, Manitoba, during the First Annual Industrial Hemp Pageant, organized by Consolidated Growers and Processors (CGP), a group of European and North American experts and investors.

CGP hopes to increase the 1200 acres contracted for in 1998 to 25,000 this year in the interest of homing in on the best growing conditions in the province and the creation of a provincial processing plant. Hemp is being planted in other Canadian provinces, as well.

If the increase in crop production in Canada is impressive, so is the proliferation of "First Annual" expositions across North America, from the Hemp Farming and Equipment Show in Winnepeg, Manitoba to the 20 year-old Health and Harmony Music and Arts Festival in Sonoma County, California.

Two magazines devoted to hemp are Hemp Times and Hemp World, available at bookstores and any boutique selling hemp products. Paging through one of these magazines is an eye-opener; the range of hemp-based products and the potential for more is truly amazing.

Memorial funds to bring in guest speakers.


Study Grants for individual projects, to explore areas of study.

Germany, Vesta was a master of the Aubusson technique, creating small masterpieces on a little frame loom set on a table or on her lap. One of her pieces had been included in an HGA Small Expressions traveling exhibit. Recently the Smithsonian Institution had contacted Vesta about her tapestries; her two daughters plan to follow up on the contact.

In addition to weaving, Vesta was a baker, taught folk dancing, did photography, painted Ukrainian Easter eggs, was a voracious reader and was knowledgeable about different healing techniques. Her friendly smile and welcoming presence in the BWG gallery, where she was a frequent worker, are sorely missed.

## Luise Zeigler 1928-1999

The weaving community lost a valued member recently with the passing of Luise Zeigler. She was born in Indiana, the daughter of German immigrants, and learned from her father's meticulous approach to woodworking that a thing is worth doing well if it is worth doing at all

She taught herself to weave beginning in 1953, joining the Seattle Weavers' Guild in 1956 after moving from Indiana. She had been a member of the Whidbey (WA) Weavers since 1973, serving at one time as guild Treasurer, handled the mailing of the newsletter and had attended the guild booth at the Island County Fair for many years.

Outside of the guild, Luise served as Membership Chair for the Association of Northwest Weavers' Guild for four years. She also had been invited to participate in the Cross-Country Weavers annual projects, helped document the work of ealier weavers, and kept detailed records of her own work, in addition to weaving numerous items for churches, organizations, friends and family.

In addition to her weaving, Luise was a dietician and baker who ran a bakery in Freeland for many years. She lent these talents as a volunteer food organizer for Habitat for Humanity.

Because of her long history of contributing to the growth of weaving, Luise had built a network of connections with other weavers throughout North America. IN

## FINDING INSPIRATION

People often ask Where do you get your ideas?

Its difficult to answer this question, because ideas are not concrete. They do not exist outside of your head, so how can you explain where they come from?

But design inspiration is also all around us, too. You can take inspiration from the most mundane of objects, or the most spectacular of natures displays.

The first step is to open your eyes and really look at things. Tree bark, the texture of cement, the petals and leaves of flowers, a grove of trees, cloud formations, a sunrise or sunset. Experience the awesome wonder of the reality of our lives.

When you really absorb the details of your surroundings, you are more open to the creativity of the universe, and become more in tune with your own creative flow.

The design process for me then becomes an exercise in elimination. Beginning with the item I want to make, I begin to visualize how I want it to look, and how I need it to function. By keeping in mind the finished object, I can imagine how various aspects of design will look on it. What colour or colours do I want it to be? What texture? What scale of design? Will there be an area of focus? Where will it go?

As I answer these questions, I try and discard many options. The whole process may take days, weeks, sometimes even months before I am finally satisfied enough with the concept to begin to execute it. And in the meantime, I am usually working on something that I have already designed, so that I am not idle during this incubation period.

Sometimes things turn out better than I visualized; sometimes they don't turn out as well as I'd thought. The important thing at this stage is to not call the item that doesn't quite measure up a failure. The finished object may be beautiful in its own right even though you are not totally happy with it. No one but you knows what the original vision looked like! They can only look at the completed object, not your vision.

The more often you complete the process, the better you will become at interpreting your dreams, so instead of being disappointed and giving up, you need to carry on with your next idea. As your technical skills grow, and your experience in materializing your dreams increases, your successes will multiply. The projects that don't meet your expectations are steps on the learning curve, and add to the foundation of knowledge you can draw on for future projects.

## "Best of Oregon" SETT to Open

The Weaving Guilds of Oregon (WeGO) is an organization committed to fostering inter-guild cooperation and communication in Oregon, and to providing educational opportunities. The purpose of WeGO is to promote and encourage weaving and related fiber arts in Oregon. Any organized guild of weaving, spinning, and related fiber activities in the state of Oregon is eligible for membership.

Shortly after WeGO was organized a void in the availability of quality fiber arts shows in galleries throughout the state was noted. In 1988-89 WeGO sponsored the first juried show of fiber arts pieces that toured Oregon. Guilds which participated in the traveling show were responsible for moving the show from site to site, setting the pieces up for display, re-packing the pieces and moving them to the next site. WeGO provided the prospectus and jurors, and organized the schedule. Our local artists provided the breathtaking pieces which made the show so successful.

The exhibit was well received and a second tour was sponsored in 1994-95. This year it was decided that the time had come to showcase the talent of Oregon weavers, spinners, dyers, and basket weavers again. Pieces submitted must have been completed since January 1998 and not previously exhibited. Submissions may encompass yardage, interior accessories such as pillows, linens, etc., wearable art, clothing and accessories, wall hangings, baskets, felting, and fiber sculpture.

All work submitted for consideration will be juried on the basis of overall design, use of color, finishing details, technical excellence, creative interpretation and technique in fiber application. The show will open at the 1999 Conference of Northwest Weavers' Guilds (ANWG) **SETT Under the Big Sky** in Bozeman, MT, and then move throughout Oregon for the next 14 months.

## PERSONAL CORNER

Sue Scott, ANWG Chair

I am a weaver. I have been a quilter, a knitter, a spinner, a cross-stitcher and a needlepointer. I guess you could say needlework of some sort or another is in my genes. But that is really not true either. My Mom sewed, but to quilt something, ah----no, I don't think so. And weaving, well, she would have used the looms for firewood long ago. Weaving has always intrigued me because of the mystery. The beautiful colors of the warp when tied together by the weft are a symphony of form and function. By adding different threadings and treadlings (the way you move your feet, almost akin to playing the organ), the possibilities for design and texture are endless. When I sit down to weave and see the design magically appear, I'm always overjoyed and awed. Who thought this stuff up? How did they know where to start?

As the millennium approaches, with all the hype and varying degrees of despair, I find myself thinking again and again of the weavers of the past. If you lined up 1,000 people, each one representing a year in the past Millennium, the number of folks actually living 25 years before, during, and 25 years after the turn of the century would be few indeed.

Not only am I lucky enough to be a human at this time, I am fortunate to be a weaver. I know the weaving studios of old had cats to keep out the mice. Now I have a mouse that gives me access to the Smithsonian Institutes Coptic Textile Collection. With that same mouse, I can buy silk from Japan, wool from Australia, cotton from Utah. I can find old weaving manuscripts, natural dyes from bugs that live on cactus in Peru and exotic wood shuttles from Hawaii or Alaska. All can be delivered to my door and paid for with the click of that mouse.

In previous times, if you were lucky enough to be a weaver, or a stained glass maker, or a lace knitter, you studied with a Master, learned what she knew and worked your whole life in a fairly small geographical area. You may never have seen anything other than what you and your fellows created. Now however, through the advances of technology and desktop publishing, I can actually reproduce Shaker rugs and textiles from patterns written in longhand by Shaker weavers. I can reproduce Overshot Coverlets that were made for only a short time in our history; few originals exist and they will never be made again. I have access to all the ingenuity, engineering, and inspiration that weavers, quilters, and needleworkers the WORLD over have come up with in the past 2,000 years!

What an exciting and sobering thought. All the past history of time on one side, all the uncertainty and potential on the other. It gives me goose bumps just thinking about it! No one really knows what the next 1,000 years will hold. However, I know I am most fortunate. I will get a glimpse of the future while having the benefit of being able to see and appreciate ALL the past.

## ASSOCIATION'S CORNER

## What is ANWG? From the ANWG Executive Board

ANWG (pronounced An-wig) stands for the Association of Northwest Weavers' Guilds. The Association is a non-profit corporation dedicated to promoting and stimulating public interest in hand-weaving and related activities, to aiding and encouraging prospective handweavers, and to conducting and assisting with the foregoing endeavours in the Northwest, including Alaska, Alberta, British Columbia, Idaho, Oregon, Montana, Northwest Territories, Saskatchewan, Washington, Wyoming, and Yukon Territory.

At present, we have about 90 member guilds, with a total representation of approximately 3,500 individuals, equally distributed between Canada and the US. Our memberships are by guild only, with fees of \$1.00 (one dollar) per guild member per year.

One of our main activities consists of sponsoring a biennial weaving and fibre arts conference, the location of which depends on the hosting guild's location from time to time. The 2001 conference, hosted by the Weaving Guilds of Oregon, will be held in Eugene, Oregon, and the 2003 conference will be hosted by the Handweavers, Spinners and Dyers of Alberta in Calgary, Alberta.

Individual members of associated guilds have priority registration at our biennial regional conferences before general registration is opened. Member guilds receive one exhibit space at no charge. A limited number of scholarships for conference attendance are offered to individuals whose guild has maintained its membership.

The Association works constantly to promote communications and educational opportunities for its members, both on the guild and individual level. We maintain a library of fibre arts related videos which are available for rental for the cost of return postage. Our website offers numerous outlets for communication, including an up-to-date Association membership and library list, conference information, space for each guild to post their profiles and activities, past copies of our quarterly newsletter, and notification of Association meetings. An online Speakers' Directory is currently under construction.

If one Rep is in attendance representing two or more guilds, one weaving only will be shown at the AGM. In such a case, a run-off between these entries prior to the meeting is suggested.

## Teaching Children

Recently our high school art teacher set up her Harrisville 4H floor loom in her son's fourth-grade class and asked for my help in warping it and teaching the 27 youngsters in the class how to weave. It sounded like a daunting challenge, but I warped the loom with 7 yards of four colors of rug warp for large mug rugs. Using similar colors of 1/2 cotton for weft, we began the project, with the help of my weaving friend Jan Burns. Hoping to inspire the children, we shared some examples of handwoven articles, gave a brief history of weaving—especially as it related to Americans in the 19th Century, and showed how recycled items (such as rag strips) can be incorporated into weav-

Before we began hands-on sessions at the loom, we tried an activity which my husband had suggested. To help the kids

understand the relationship of the warp and the weft, we created a "living loom" using 10 children for the warp and one little guy as the shuttle carrying the weft. Five kids knelt on the floor, shoulder to shoulder, opposite another five, with an end of a 5-foot piece of clothesline held in each hand. As they held the rope pieces taut, we showed them how to create the shed through which the "shuttle" would pass as he carried a ball of rag strips. Then the shed changed, and the weft-carrier traveled between the layers of warp. After only four "picks" of the weft, we packed in the weft to illustrate what woven cloth looks like. Everyone in the class had volunteered to be part of the living loom, but there was time for just the one group of 11 to "play loom".

Then we worked with groups of four children at the Harrisville loom, each one having a chance to weave. They learned quickly, and all seemed interested. The results of their first effort looked great.

The youngsters will have access to the loom next year as fifth-graders. We'd welcome any advice about sharing with children our love for weaving.

# The Skagit Valley Weaver's Guild Celebrates!

The Skagit Valley Weaver's Guild, based in the Mt. Vernon/Anacortes area of Washington state, celebrates their 25th anniversary in 2000.

Our guild has been re-energized by some simple changes in direction, which seem to be keeping our members enthusiastic about weaving. Inadequate funds forced us to look beyond the usual guild-sponsored programs for fresh ideas, so for a couple of years we had study groups built around themes. When the treasury was restored to a comfortable level we scheduled a large workshop—twenty four participants with looms. The three-day workshop was supposed to involve warping the looms and trading looms for sampling. However the workshop leader's many hot tips and enthusiasm proved to be contagious! It quickly became apparent that we had more weaving than daylight hours, so we opted for lectures and demonstrations and put the looms aside to finish the weaving at home. Actually, we never swapped looms at all, which turned out to be a wonderful bonus because we had plenty of time to work on beat, squaring, and selvedges. By the time we did trade samples they were fine examples of the weave structure we were working

with. We highly recommend the format of workshops with more lectures, ample demonstration, and plenty of time for interaction!

Looking forward to 2000-2001, we plan to do a year on garment construction. We'll begin with a one-day workshop on planning basics in the fall followed by a three-day work shop on construction in the spring. But the best part is our members are WEAVING, sharing, volunteering, and voting "yes" to even more!

On my 60th birthday in 1995 I retired from my "other life". Ever since, I have been wondering how I ever had time to go to work?! John had retired in 1982, and he kept warning me - "you never get a day off"! He's right - and I love it! The one-car garage became "Studio B", and we now have a car port...

Last year Sue Scott, as Vice-President of ANWG, visited a WeGO meeting, and discussed with us the need for more member involvement in ANWG, and encouraged us to volunteer for nomination to the ANWG Board positions that were open. A few days later I contacted Sue and said that I would like to help.

At the ANWG General Meeting in Bozeman I was elected Vice-President, and Sue became President. Now Sue has decided that her life is full to overflowing, and has resigned her ANWG position.

Please join me in wishing Sue all the best in her life, and thank her for her years of dedication to ANWG as guild rep, newsletter editor, Vice-President and President.

I look forward to continuing my "Weaving Tale" with ANWG over the next few years, and I ask...No - let's make that - I EXPECT your cooperation, and INVOLVEMENT as together, we make ANWG a better organization for all of the members!

# Minutes Of The General Meeting by Ilona Schneider

## Saturday, June 3, 2000 Double Tree Inn, Pasco, WA.

Acting Chairman, Nadine Purcell, called the meeting to order at 9:40 a.m. with an introduction of the Board members. There were 25 people present, representing 22 guilds.

**Minutes:** Acting Chairman, Nadine Purcell, read the abbreviated minutes, which were moved amended by Ruth Locke, and seconded by Yvonne Coopmans. Motion carried.

## Treasurer's Report: Ruth Locke

The Report attached, shows an opening balance Sept 10,1999, in the chequing account of \$3,931.38 plus income from dues of \$3,760.00, operating funds taken from CD #1 in the amount of \$3,641.24, plus other income items of \$474.57, for a total income of \$7,875.81. Expenses totaled \$5,106.22 leaving a current operating balance of \$6,700.22. Included in the expenses are two new items, Liability Insurance at \$750.00 and Website at \$265.25. The Flexifund balance of \$15,468.14, is mainly comprised of the seed money of \$10,000.00 plus the 20% profit of \$3,817.32, and the refund of two scholarships for \$400 received from the Bozeman Conference. Ruth noted that total funds remain around the \$50,000.00 level.

There is currently \$2000.00 seeded to the Eugene Conference, with a further \$5000.00 requested. Ruth Locke moved her report be accepted, seconded by Valerie Day, Seaview Weavers. Motion carried.

## **Board Member Reports**

## Chairman: Nadine Purcell

Sue Scott resigned as Chairman, due to the loss of family members and the need to prioritize her life. Nadine Purcell, Vice Chair, has become Acting Chair for ANWG. Nadine has been busy familiarizing herself with the past three years of ANWG correspondence and minutes.

A proposed nominating committee for the Executive Board for 2001 is in process. Nadine asked for names or contacts for any of the board positions and advised there will be job descriptions available. There are two possible hosts/sites for Conference 2005, however if anyone is interested please contact the board. We have a newly established Conference Guideline book to support Conference hosts. Future considerations regarding Reps responsibilities, revitalizing ANWG, and establishing Conference Hosts to 2005, were voiced.

## **Education: Laura Fry**

Rentals: Laura noted that the majority of videos have been rented through the Web, with only one telephone request. The majority of subjects have been on spinning, dyeing and other fibre crafts. There was discussion regarding video cost versus the budget of \$200 for the year. Celeste Pryde, Membership Chair, donated the video Art of Guatemala Weaving, Darlene Mulholland, Prince George, donated the Sante Fe Fashion Show video, and Noreen Rustad, Guild of Canadian Weavers President, donated the GCW Master Weavers video to the ANWG library. Since Laura Fry will be attending Convergence in Cincinnati, she will seek some new videos. It was suggested that a question sheet for Reps' input on future video purchases be put on the website.

Scholarships: A reminder that applications are available now, and there will be 11 available for Eugene, rather than 10 due to

the death of one of the Bozeman Conference recipients. Deadline is Dec 15, 2000.

Speakers Directory: Development has begun on a Teacher's Registry to for the Website, and the intent is for teachers to supply information and guilds to use the directory to make contact with teachers. Laura Fry moved her report be accepted, seconded by Betty Bell, Moonspinners. Motion carried.

## Membership: Celeste Pryde

There are 91 member guilds registered this year, with a total membership of 3,701. This is a decrease of 8 member guilds from the prior year, with one being a closed guild, and 2 guilds from Montana not renewing. Currently MAWS (Montana Association of Weavers and Spinners) is not registered, which consists of 246 individuals. The annual guild registration form for 2001 will be included with the next newsletter. A new job description has been completed for the Rep position, and will be made available with the dues registration packet.

Celeste introduced to the attendees the guild map she had made, which formed the ANWG booth, taken to the recent HWSDA Conference in Alberta. Everyone was taken with the Map, and Celeste will provide 8x10 copies to guilds upon request., once the cost is determined. Chair Nadine Purcell thanked Celeste for her work on the display. Celeste moved her report be accepted, seconded by Maria Schultz, Lethbridge. Motion carried.

Motion: moved by Vicki Leuba, Spokane,WA., seconded by Sidney Sparks, Whidby Island, that the poster prepared by Celeste Pryde be distributed to the member guilds by a mechanism to be determined by the Executive Board. Motion carried.

#### **Communication: Yvonne Coopmans**

Newsletter: Yvonne advised savings of \$856.87 on the ANWG newsletter this past year, which is attributed to the reduction of a single copy to a guild, to a reduction from 8 pages to 4 pages, with a reduction in printing and postage costs. There was a strong consensus by Reps that accessing the Newsletter on the Web was a great facility.

Web Site: Gloria Way, Rogue Valley, asked if we had an update of all guilds on the Web. Discussion covered supplier Links, and the profile page on guilds. It was noted that the use of the Web site had increased 50% over last year. Chair Nadine Purcell noted how fortunate we were to have both Jerry and Yvonne Coopmans involved with the Web site. Yvonne Coopmans moved her report be accepted, seconded by Vicki Leuba, Spokane, WA. Motion carried.

## Conference Reports:

## Conference 2001 - A Weaving Odyssey, Eugene, OR.

As Chair, Suzie Liles is traveling in Indonesia, Nadine Purcell, Registrar, provided a brief report. She advised that contracts are out to the Speaker and Instructors, and exciting workshops are planned. The Goody bags being done by the Oregon guilds are going to be spectacular, with 12 different items currently committed, including 750 mug rugs. There will be more information available in the Fall, by mail, e-mail, and through the Website. The site for the conference is the same as 1991. The registration packets are planned to be available by Nov. 30th. With reference to proposed attendance, Valerie Day, Seaview Weavers, questioned Nadine Purcell on the number anticipated. She replied that 750 was a working figure, however income and expense does need to be calculated on the basis of break even figures, possible 500-600 attendees.

## A "Weaving Tale"

## by Nadine Purcell, President

Once upon a time...about 1967, I wanted a knitting machine for Christmas. I took John (my husband) to shops, told him the wonders I could produce, the savings (?) of a knitting machine, and I really thought I had him convinced...

Christmas came, and there sat a LARGE box under the tree! I tore into the box, and I am afraid my face fell (no videocams in those days) - what WAS that "thing"?!! It was a table loom...actually the first loom I could ever remember seeing. It was warped and ready to weave, and away I went! I still have that loom - I do NOT have a knitting machine, and that's OK with me.

That "surprise" gift has lead us both (John got hooked on weaving too) into a wonderful world of friendships and organizations - literally around the world.

In the late '70's we traveled to Seattle to the home of Irma Robinson where a group of weavers gathered to discuss forming a regional organization to foster communication between guilds, and perhaps to help sponsor conferences. Russ Groff was the leader of the discussion. Was this an early ANWG meeting?

Our first ANWG weaving conference was in Eugene in 1981. It was organized by a group of Oregon guilds under the leadership of Dee Ford Potter. Our "job" as representatives of Saturday Handweavers Guild was to manage the "Swatch Swap".

Following that conference the guilds in Oregon decided to form a statewide organization - Weaving Guilds of Oregon. It was my privilege to serve as President of WeGO for four years.

We continued attending ANWG conferences as our job schedules permitted, and also became involved in other ANWG activities - as Guild Reps, and John served a term on the ANWG Executive Board. The number of looms kept growing, and the guest room at home became a weaving studio...

In 1991 I served as Conference Chairman for "Weaving Tales" in Eugene. John was known to many of you there as "Gofer".

On my 60th birthday in 1995 I retired from my "other life". Ever since, I have been wondering how I ever had time to go to work?! # Online Voting for Board Business Bylaws Change Needed

While the ANWG bylaws require that the general membership meet once a year, the Executive board is required to meet twice a year; once prior to the annual general membership (AGM) meeting, and once during the Fall. For the past two years, these board meetings have been very expensive to hold and have not provided adequate time to address all the business that needed to be done. While the Fall meetings have been conducted by telephone conference call in order to keep expenses down, the last one, in 1998, cost over \$1,000 for three hours.

For the past two years the Executive Board has been taking advantage of Internet technology to discuss topics and reach consensus on issues by e-mail and our website to make the scheduled meetings more efficient. In order to make the web serve us even better, we have investigated using our website for officially conducting business (that is, by offering topics for motions, debate, and voting).

What we found was that the idea of conducting business online is a relatively new concept for most groups, and Robert's Rules, Ninth edition (published in 1990) has yet to catch up with it. Washington State law currently permits telephone or similar types of meetings so long as everyone can hear everyone else at the same time, but they don't yet address the question of electronic, asynchronous meetings which are conducted over a specific span of time. Nonetheless, such online meetings are being used in various forms by other organizations like ANWG who's members are separated by large distances.

We have developed a procedure for electronic meetings of the Board, although no such votes are binding until they are entered into the minutes of a scheduled (regular or special) meeting. Therefore, we must adopt them into our bylaws in order for the Board to actually conduct business online.

The Executive Board has therefore added the issue of changing the bylaws to permit online Board meetings to the agenda for the AGM meeting in June, 2001.


