Participants had opportunities to win door prizes, raffle prizes and a last minute chance to buy tickets for the Overshot coverlets made by the members.

Guild members took part in Canada celebrations at the National Historic site of Fort Langley with spinning and yarn preparation demonstrations.

Whonnock Weavers Guild

The Whonnock Weavers and Spinners Guild (WWSG) has had a colourful start to the year. Our monthly programs have focussed on a variety of aspects of working with colour. We've explored different ways to work with colour as a primer for our Guild "Crayon Challenge" reveal at the end of June.

We've learned about spindle spinning from a local spindle spinning expert; we played with colour theory with a local fibre artist; we explored different ways to spin batts; and even did some needle felting!

Another highlight of this spring was a visit to Guild president Sherry's fibre "barn" for a Fleece Day where she lead us through a study of fleece from sheep to spinning. We had two Romeldale fleeces to look at and share, and learned what makes a good fleece and how best to work with it. A wonderful thing about our Guild is our diverse areas of interest and levels of expertise, and how we share it all with each other.

We were also delighted to have had the opportunity to showcase some of our Guild members' work at our local library this May!

We're now getting ready for our first big community engagement event of 2024, which is our local fair "Country Fest" at the end of July. Here we will share our love of fibre arts with our local community through a demonstration involving a LOT of colourful wool for our guests to see, feel, and play with. Visitors will be invited to choose some wool and will then get to card it on a drum carder and then spin it. They may even have a chance to weave a small project with their own hand-spun yarn! The bright coloured fibre and the boundless enthusiasm of our member helpers is sure to entice those who visit us, and we're sure that some will want


to learn more. Who knows, we may ignite a life-long passion for fibre arts in someone!


