ANWG Members Education

I served as the Membership Chair in ANWG for six years and when asking guilds for the annual dues, I often heard 'what does ANWG offer between conferences?' Believe me, the conference chairs are working at full speed to offer these events, we just don't see what's happening 'behind the curtain,' but here is a solution to fill those quiet months for the rest of us. As your new ANWG Education Chair I am proposing two initiatives with the first starting this fall.

- 1) I'm a member of several larger weaving guilds and since 2020 (the advent of zoom), these guilds have been offering short seminars and workshops presented by our own members on a volunteer basis, meaning no cost to the rest of our membership. Among 4300+ members in the ANWG group, we/you have so much talent and skill that you can offer and in turn this can give our talented members a venue to teach. The workshops or seminars would be limited to two-hour sessions, would be open to all ANWG members (but limited to a cap of registrations) and available on a Zoom or Google platform. I'm asking for 'instructor' proposals to start scheduling a fall lineup so I would ask for an email/text or a phone call to discuss your proposal and subject matter. Remember, this simple 'volunteer' virtual teaching opportunity may be a platform for an individual who would like to venture into the 'instructors' world and could include weaving, spinning, dyeing or fiber arts in general. Be bold, step up and get experience to use on a future resume. Be a STAR!
- 2) My larger proposal involves using virtual platforms already in use by other high-profile regional guilds such as MidAtlantic Fiber Association (MAFA), Intermountain Weavers Conference (IWC),

Conference of Northern California Handweavers (CNCH), Handweavers Guild of America (HGA) and now Complex Weavers (CW). This project would involve offering seminars by well-known national and international fiber arts instructors on a 'paid' basis with a nominal fee to registrants. I would love to answer questions again using email/text/phone, encourage you to explore the above guilds online and become familiar with this virtual tool. For now, I would like to solicit suggestions from our membership on instructors you would like to see in a future offering. This format would not conflict with our conference workshops or seminars, it would simply offer membership a learning experience in those lean years. We are a large guild with a huge membership and should be putting ourselves out there.

Please consider one or both options and let's talk about how we can develop a solid educational opportunity for our members, and if you would like to be a more intimate part of the experience, I would love to put together a short team to accomplish this. Please email/text/call any time with your suggestions and interests. The Education Program belongs to all members so a special request to our ANWG Guild Representatives: please share with your guild members to get the widest coverage and best response.

Most guilds take a hiatus from regular meetings for the summer. One of the first orders of business in the fall should be paying dues for your guild's ANWG membership. Membership is a bargain at \$1/per member (USD) per guild as of June 30 of the just completed year. Membership dues are payable beginning September 1 and are considered delinquent after December 1. Membership forms are found on the ANWG website (https://northwestweavers.org/about/membership/) and can be completed on paper or online. Dues may be paid with a check and included with the paper membership form, or by using PayPal and an online membership form. Dues are to be paid in US dollars.

One of the primary roles of the guild representative is communication. They should send out the ANWG newsletter or the link to the newsletter to their guild members. Newsletters go out quarterly and are a wealth of information about other guilds activities and, this year, will be a good source of ANWG activities. Reps also communicate any changes in representation to the membership chair as well as the webmaster so the information is up-to-date. That information is used by the ANWG board to communicate to the guilds. This is also the way to get the word out that your guild is there—what a great way to advertise to potential new members!

Another benefit of ANWG membership is the conference. The 2025 ANWG conference will be held June 16-21, 2025, at the Yakima Conference Center in Yakima, Washington. 

The Columbia Fibres Guild had our annual Fran Connolly Founder's Picnic as the last meeting before our summer break. Fran was a great progenitor for many of us learning to spin and weave. It was a delight and an inspiration to know Fran. I am certain she is keeping the angels busy spinning their whorls. We also remembered our dear friend Judy Bayley who recently passed away. This photo of Fran was taken on the front porch of Judy's family's wheat ranch homestead in eastern Oregon.

The Columbia Fibres Guild was awarded an educational grant from WeGO. We decided to use the money to bring Cheshire Mayrsohn for a one day and a two day natural dye workshops in September. We also received a grant from ANWG (and thank you again for the support!). Those funds will be used to create four permanent fiber art displays for our local county fairs. We had good success promoting fiber arts last year at the Hood River Blossom Festival with demonstrations, displays, and hands-on activities. These permanent displays will continue to educate the public about the many pleasures to be found working with fiber.

Our annual field trip was a visit to the Pendleton Woolen Mills in Washougal, Washington. In May we shared the results of our Guild challenge. This year we made a bag from rare/endangered breeds of sheep or rare fiber. Izzy Baptiste used Himalayan nettle fiber for her bag. Other bags were woven, knitted, and felted. The challenge for next year is to make a lap robe or cap to be donated to a local hospice service in Judy's memory.

A number of our members are involved in the Textile Restoration Project at Timberline Lodge. This includes weaving upholstery fabric based on the original Mary Atwater patterns, and applique on the enormous drapes at the Lodge. Our Guild also donated a copy of Atwater's book for the Lodge's archive. We are honored to contribute to the preservation and continuation of the exquisite handwork traditions at Timberline Lodge.

The Tuesdays Fiber Crafts group continues to meet regularly. An ice dye party is planned for the near future.

Lastly, we welcomed our new Guild president, Elizabeth Maker-Al Habsi and co-vice presidents Dr. Rachael Foss and Bekah Fisher. The two vice presidents are relatively new members and a younger generation so we are especially happy to welcome them to the Board of Directors.

So keep those wheels spinning and the shuttles flying!

We used ProcionX dyes and large amounts of commercial ice cubes...the sunshine did the rest! Other personal projects in progress are Nuno felted shawls, knitted shawls, , and continuing discussions for our group project for 2025 Conference.

The April meeting included "tantalizing tutorials" on how to "box" a bag, make dryer balls, sew invisible seams, and make a Kumihimo braid. In May guild members demonstrated at Qualicum beach Family Day and at a local elementary school.

The "Knitorious Knitters" meet twice a month, Fun with Four and the Exploring More weavers study groups both meet once a month. Several towels and dishcloths have been woven on the guild looms.

Salem Fiberarts Guild

May 4th was a soggy day but that didn't dampen the enthusiasm of the visitors to the Sheep to Shawl Fest at the Willamette Heritage Center. The Salem Fiberarts Guild coordinated the fiber demonstrators, including weavers, spinners, knitters, lace makers, hand stitchers, crocheters, felters,

and needlepoint artists. Attendees of all ages learned how to transform wool into yarn, fabric, and art. The featured guest at the Guild's April meeting was textile artist and author Karen Selk who shared her vast knowledge of and personal experiences with Indian silk. Guild members obtained a new appreciation of the process of spinning and weaving silk, and how important this fiber is to many communities in India.

Several members of the Guild learned about tapestry weaving from Terry Olson of the Damascus Fiber Arts School in a 3-day workshop in April.

May's speaker was Mela Hoyt-Heydon, milliner and designer of head wear. Mela's vintage-inspired designs have been featured in movies, theatrical shows, and entertainment venues worldwide, and her Salem, Oregon boutique *Atelier Mela* displays many of her beautiful creations. Guild members were especially interested when Mela passed around wool, rabbit, and alpaca hat forms and demonstrated steaming and fitting the wool form over a cloche hat block.

In June, Tiffany Yazzie of the Navajo Nation in Arizona shared images of her dyed handspun yarns and radiant "Eye Dazzler" weavings. She explained how her art is a connection to her maternal ancestors' traditions in sheep and goat farming and in weaving pictorial rugs.




San Juan County Textile Guild

We have chosen a modified hop vine design to honor the hops grown in the Yakima area. The weave structure is overshot and plain weave. The warps and wefts will be in various combinations of the six conference colors so they will be beautiful. Over 20 members of our guild have volunteered to weave and sew the 500 name badge holders.

Seven weavers and two groups of weavers have volunteered. Sewists will sew the badge holders together and then finishers will complete the badge holders by spinning lanyard cords. We are excited as we embark on this ambitious project!

We were also delighted to have had the opportunity to showcase some of our Guild members' work at our local library this May!

We're now getting ready for our first big community engagement event of 2024, which is our local fair "Country Fest" at the end of July. Here we will share our love of fibre arts with our local community through a demonstration involving a LOT of colourful wool for our guests to see, feel, and play with. Visitors will be invited to choose some wool and will then get to card it on a drum carder and then spin it. They may even have a chance to weave a small project with their own hand-spun yarn! The bright coloured fibre and the boundless enthusiasm of our member helpers is sure to entice those who visit us, and we're sure that some will want to learn more. Who knows, we may ignite a life-long passion for fibre arts in someone!
