We look forward to hosting you and your guild members in Bend.



Guild Challenge Grants For 2022-2023 — Deadline Fast Approaching

Remember, the ANWG Board voted to offer additional guild challenge grants for use over the next two years before the 2023 ANWG Conference in Oregon. We will be able to offer five US \$600 grants to those guilds with a current membership. We hope many member guilds will apply for a grant. The website https://northwestweavers.org always has the most current information on what's going on in ANWG.

The deadline to apply is November 1, 2021, with winners announced in the January, 2022 ANWG newsletter and on the website. Grants are available to any guild or study group within a guild that is a member in good standing with ANWG (current in their dues).

For those guilds who have never applied for a grant, we hope you will plan an event/workshop/or community activity and apply for funding. This is a wonderful way to be able to offer a high level educational opportunity to your members and/or the community at a reasonable cost. GOAL: To promote weaving and all related fiber arts and to preserve all the traditions of these arts.

To accomplish this goal, ANWG will award grants for activities such as lectures, seminars, workshops, research projects, retreats, etc. Up to five US \$600 grants will be awarded for use between January 2022 and June 2023. These grants are made possible because two Annual Membership Meetings were held electronically during the time of the pandemic saving the administrative expenses that would have been incurred.

Ponderosa Fibre Arts Guild Challenge Grant Report August, 2021



Our new pandemic world meant that our challenge grant workshop, **Mastering the Backward Worsted Back Twist and Plying Workshop** by Kim McKenna was conducted online instead of the planned in person workshop for 8 participants. Instruction was modified into 3 workshops over 6 sessions, some of which were opened up to allow more participants.

Kim began with a demonstration and slideshow of Wool Combing to allow people to become familiar with the technology. Nineteen participants, including some from 6 other guilds (some ANWG members), enjoyed this free workshop.

The second workshop was the **Backwards Worsted Drafting and Plying Method Workshop** Kim conducted over 4 sessions online with 8 participants. We have previously offered Kim's **Forward Draft Workshop** which most participants had done. With this workshop, they discovered a whole new method and learned when to use each type of drafting/plying and how to spin consistently.

People found that the online sessions were more focused than in person and were amazed by how well it worked. "We all learned to position ourselves so she could watch us spin and give us individual suggestions about our techniques." Kim was able to help each person one-on-one several times during each session. One person was in a rural setting and especially appreciated being able to attend.

Participants learned how technique makes a difference to spinning, how understanding the process helps both spinning technique and yarn quality, learned several specific methods and tips and learned to appreciate the importance of fibre preparation in all stages. Kim's plying technique "gave all of us an effective, alternative method to ply smooth two and three-ply yarns".

Several people commented on how the instruction has made a positive difference to their spinning and plying. One participant noted "this has brought me the confidence that my hands are connected to what I am trying to create and that I just need to allow the fibre and my hands do the work."

The final online workshop was on blending fibres for spinning with people using their own

equipment leading to instruction about use of blending boards, hand carders, drum carders and combs. Kim provided samples to encourage blending a variety of fibres. Not only was Kim's instruction helpful to each individual, but watching others with their equipment and participating in the conversation about the how and why of each was also valuable. Discussion and hands-on demonstration of dizzing off blended fibre was appreciated as well.




Paper Weaving


Double Rainbow Weaving Workshop Presented by Jennifer Moore

Twenty guild members participated in the September **Double Rainbow Doubleweave** workshop with Jennifer Moore on Zoom. The concept of being able to weave 2 layers of cloth at the same time is intriguing and provides a multi-functional handwoven fabric with many uses. Our group warped in a variety of colorways with 10/2 cotton or 5/2 cotton, and Mary Wonser even used 5/2 Bamboo. Both 4-shaft and 8-shaft projects were woven. The results were fun to see in the final session's show and share. Here are a few of the examples we saw:

2021 has seen not only the continuation of the pandemic in the Walla Walla Valley but record breaking heat and extreme drought with an overlay of wildfire smoke in late summer. Mary Jane was a teacher/sheep farmer who was instrumental in establishing the local Sheep to Shawl, an annual event at the Kirkman House Museum.
